Library east boundary	• The Nimble Hill Road right of way is about 77 feet from the east side of the old library.
	• If the library boundary is set all the way to the road, about 100 feet from the old library building, the library trustees will be the deciding entity for anything that happens in the ROW, to the exclusion of the selectmen.
	• The selectmen have to decide what they want to do.
Library south boundary	• Three different boundaries keep coming up.
	• The library trustees want a maximum boundary of 100 feet from the southern-most extension of the new building. The HDC concurs <u>as long as a right-of-way</u> <u>easement across the library lot exists for vehicles to enter and exit the cemetery</u> (see below).
	• The library trustees do not want the care of the veterans' memorial area, so will come back with dimensions that cut this southeastern corner out of their boundaries.
	• The HDC concurs <u>but there needs to be a 10-foot buffer around all parts of the</u> <u>cannons on the north and west sides.</u>
Road to exit southern cemetery	• The library trustees envision that the hearse and other vehicles exiting the cemetery will drive through the parking lots and out to the road.
	• The HDC agrees <u>as long as a right-of-way easement across the library lot exists for</u> <u>vehicles to enter and exit the cemetery.</u>
Selectmen	No warrant articles will be proposed this year.
	• The selectmen will provide the \$5,000 in funding to begin the memorial garden.
	• Ted Connors does not think a further archeological study is necessary.
	• IAC was planning to begin the study in early spring and will need to be contacted.
	• <u>The HDC will proceed with the archeological dig once the parties agree to the</u> <u>boundaries of the memorial garden/unmarked burials, which is expected within the</u> <u>month.</u>
	 The \$3,000 will come from the special projects line item of the HDC budget.
	• The results of the study will add to our knowledge about the presence, or not, of fallen and buried gravestones inside the cemetery, as well as further develop the story about the unmarked burials.
Bloody Point Historic District	• Discussed a response to the January 27, 2021 letter from NH DOT concerning the General Sullivan Bridge and rehabilitation of the Old Railroad Depot and the surrounding land.
	• Lulu to draft a response and coordinate with the selectmen.

	• NH DHR asked the NH Preservation Alliance to host the presentation, which will focus more on the overall Section 106 process rather than just the history of agriculture in Newington.
