Road Agent Message:

Grant Award- The Rockingham Planning Commission awarded a grant of \$5,000. to Newington for a Road Surface Management System project. This provided Newington with information on their road system's condition and estimates for future maintenance costs. The main objective of this project is to identify distressed pavement manifestations such as cracking or rutting so that Newington can prioritize maintenance to maximize their return on investment and road quality. The process involved completing a road inventory, condition survey, priority analysis, repair selection, and planning/budget preparation. The final reports have been completed and will be used to develop the 2019 Highway Resurfacing budget.

Woodbury Avenue: This spring the State Department of Transportation will continue work on the improvements to the Woodbury Avenue corridor in preparation of turning the road over to the Town in the fall. The upgrades will include replacing the traffic signals with state-of-the-art integrated technology, resetting granite curbing, correcting the vertical alignment at Piscataqua Drive and Woodbury Avenue, and repaving the corridor from Fox Run Road to the Town line at Gosling Road.

In addition to the work completed by the State, the Town is incorporating additional roadway improvements into the project. Right turn slip lanes will be constructed into both Piscataqua Drive and into The Crossings Mall which will ease traffic congestion. Portions of the Woodbury Avenue raised concrete median will be removed from Fox Run Road to Piscataqua Drive to provide vegetation. Piscataqua Drive will be reconstructed from the limits of the State ROW to Shattuck Way.

Eversource Transmission Line Expansion Update:

The Board of Selectmen met with the Durham Town Administrator about the Eversource Transmission Line Expansion. They discussed strategies regarding an appeal. It was agreed to wait for further discussion until the attorneys review the written SEC order.

All of the SEC transcripts are complete and available on the town website but we are still waiting for the final written SEC decision and reasoning behind it. Once the town attorneys receive this they will be able to determine what action to recommend. We expect the SEC decision to be issued in early February.

In the meantime the Selectmen have charged the town attorneys with review of the meeting transcripts.

The Selectmen and Denis Hebert welcome any questions at any time. These can be forwarded to <u>mroy@townofnewingtonnh.com</u> and she will forward them to whomever you address the e-mail to.

The Selectmen plan to have a public hearing as soon as the above information and analysis have been completed. We will send out an informational mailer to all residences outlining the issues as well.

Denis Hebert is available, as the Town's point person for this matter, to discuss concerns with any resident. His home number is 431-0587. He has stated that residents are welcome to call with questions.

Anticipation of Taxes Loan

In answer to some questions the Town Hall has received; tax bills were mailed out late this year and as a result cash flow was low in December. In order to meet our commitments we borrowed funds for 14 days, after discussion, at a joint meeting with the Sewer Commission. The Sewer Commission agreed to the loan with the approval of their legal counsel.

We are very appreciative and want to publicly thank the Sewer Commissioners for their cooperation.

Minutes of the Selectmen's meeting and Sewer Commission reflect this meeting and are on line to be viewed. Thanks again to the Sewer Commissioners.

Recreation News



There were varied answers to the question on how you rate us in distributing information.
