First off, I would like to thank all the residents that came out for annual town meeting. The continued support of your Fire Department over the years, especially this year, is very much appreciated and I feel very privileged to be a part of it. We have already advertised the positions on the state's employment site and various social media sites. We look forward to seeing how the next couple of months go with the whole hiring process.

Things continue to be busy around the fire station. Calls for service continue to be steady across the board. Inspections are also picking up with the increased building in Town. These inspections include both new construction and renovations. Things will get even busier with the recent ground breaking of the new hotel on Woodbury Avenue and Chick-fil-A.



As it is Spring, I would like to remind residents of the burn permit process. Anyone who wishes to burn clean, ordinary combustibles such as leaves, brush or untreated lumber, or have a camp/cooking fire **MUST** have written permission from the landowner and a fire permit from the local fire department in the town where the fire will be kindled or you can obtain a permit online at: <u>https://nhdflweb.sovsportsnet.net/</u>. The online option does have a fee that goes to pay for the 3<sup>rd</sup> party web services. You **MUST** be at least 18 years of age to obtain a written fire permit. And as always, you can either stop by the fire station or give us a call and we can come to you to get a permit with no fee.

# Spring Yard Cleanup Safety Tips

Blue skies, chirping birds, warming temperatures — April is prime time for getting home exteriors, yards, and gardens back into shape. But before you get started on your outdoor to-do list, make sure you take appropriate safety precautions.

## Dress for the job

- Wear shoes or boots, not sandals, to protect your toes.
- Properly fitting gloves can not only improve your grip on tools but also help keep skin safe from blisters, sunburn, bug bites, poisonous plants, and chemicals.
- Hearing protection is a must-have when using loud equipment.
- Safety glasses keep flying objects out of your eyes.
- Bug spray keeps the pests away. Shower after use to remove the chemicals from your skin. And while you're at it, take a minute to look for ticks. If you find one, gently pull it out with tweezers.
- Apply SPF to any exposed skin. Don't be fooled by cloudy days; you can still get a sunburn.

#### Work smart

- Take time to stretch and warm up before the work begins. Weeding, trimming, and raking are repetitive motions change your posture or stance every few minutes and switch activities every 30 minutes.
- Lift properly by bending at the knees and hips and using leg power rather than bending at the waist and putting the strain on your back. Instead of carrying heavy or unwieldy loads, employ a cart or wheelbarrow.
- Drink water and take breaks in the shade. Even if it's not hot or humid, yard work is exercise, and staying hydrated is important to avoid heat-related illness.
- Don't drink and drive. Don't text and drive. The same rules that apply to vehicles apply to power tools, including lawn mowers. Say no to distractions and anything that might cloud judgment.

#### **Ready the tools**

- Familiarize yourself with power tools and how they work. Read owner's manuals (many are available online) and know about various switches, modes, and required maintenance.
- Check cords on tools and extension cords for cuts, cracks, and frayed wires and do not use them if damaged. Also check the label to make sure you don't use an indoor extension cord outside.
- Make sure tools are in the "off" position before plugging them in or unplugging.
- Use ladders safely: Set on a firm, level surface; never stand on one of the top three rungs; and use a utility belt to hold tools so you can properly climb facing the ladder.
- Call 811 before you dig. This notifies local utilities to check your property before you plant a tree, dig a trench, or set fence posts.

#### Protect loved ones

- Be sure children and pets are inside (or well supervised if out) while you work.
- Store sharp tools, weed killer, fertilizer, and other dangerous items in a locked cabinet out of reach of curious hands and mouths.
- Before allowing any child to operate a mower, sound judgment, strength, coordination, and maturity are necessary. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that children should have these characteristics and be at least 12 years old before operating any type of mower and at least 16 years old to operate a riding mower. Be sure to educate and supervise kids as they learn how to safely use the equipment.





# April Building/Health Dept Newsletter

What a busy month of March it was! Lots of new construction work has been taking place in town! Valve replacement on Fox Point, new houses going up off of Nimble Hill rd., Chick-fil-A is underway (No, it's not a April Fool's joke, its really happening) and the hotel on Woodbury Ave is moving along.

As the weather will eventually start feeling like spring, and spring projects will be underway I wanted to talk about something that happens more often than most people realize. A fire broke out at a job site in town, not only once but twice due to not disposing of stain/finish rags properly. Never leave used finish rags inside the home or business when done for the day. These rags or applicators need to be disposed of properly.



\*Do not pile or ball rags soaked with oil finish into a tight mass or toss them in the regular trash while they're still wet.

\*Let the rags soak in a metal container outside filled with water to dilute left over product on rags. \*Do allow the rags to dry thoroughly before disposal. Spread the rags outdoors, on the ground or on a metal rack, until completely dry and somewhat hard. Two full days is usually enough time, but it might take longer.

\*Once the rags are completely dry, they should be safe for disposal. Put them in the trash on collection day. This method allows the oil to fully cure without overheating.

I also want to remind everyone as they start spending more time outside with family, friends and pets that the ticks will be out and about soon, if not already!

We have had an uptick in scams calling residents claiming they have won the Publishing Clearing House Award. The caller will inform you that you have won a considerable sum of money and a new vehicle. They will ask you for some personal information but not be too intrusive. They will then instruct you to go to Walgreens or a box store and purchase a cash card for various amounts. They will give you a separate phone number to call once the card is purchased. When you call the number, they will ask you to scratch the back of the card and provide the now visible code numbers to the card. They will then ask you for the code, stealing the cash amount of the card.

We received the call at the police department and as I was talking with the Publisher Clearing House "agent," I could hear a rooster in the background. When asked about the rooster, the "agent" hung up on me.

The reason I know the scam is going through town, is because residents have been doing their due diligence and notifying us after they receive the call and prior to taking any action.

As I have said before, prior to making any decisions when you receive a cold phone call claiming you have won a prize, charity, or person claiming they are from the IRS or law enforcement, asking for personal information or money, please let us know. We can and will verify the information for you to see if it is a scam.



With the warmer weather just around the corner and hopefully here as you read this, more people will be out walking or running on the roadways. We all must do our part, both pedestrians and motor vehicle operators, to be safe. Some helpful hints.

-Always run or walk towards (facing) traffic. This way you can see the vehicle or cyclist coming towards you and you can move off the paved portion of the roadway.

-Wear bright colors, day, and night, so people can see you. If running at night wear reflective gear. -If running in a group on the roadway, run single file, as vehicles approach.

# NH RSA: 265:39 Pedestrians on Roadway

**II.** Where a sidewalk is not available, any pedestrian walking along and upon a way shall walk only on a shoulder, as far as practicable from the edge of the roadway. Where neither a sidewalk nor a shoulder is available, any pedestrian walking along and upon a way shall walk as near as practicable to an outside edge of the roadway, and if on a two-way roadway, shall walk only on the left side of the roadway.

**III.** Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, any pedestrian upon a roadway shall yield the right of way to all vehicles upon the roadway.

We are all sharing the roadways, walkers, runners, cyclists, and motor vehicles. Be patient and courteous to others.

Thank you to everyone who came out and voted at the town meeting on March 16<sup>th</sup>. I do enjoy talking with and meeting residents and listening to your concerns. Your continued support for the department is appreciated and recognized by the men and women who serve you.

# FOX POINT TRAIL DIVERTED UPDATE

Due to the **Portsmouth Waterline Valve Replacement Project at the Point**, the trail that traverses the Point from the docks through the woods to the bench at the tip of the Point will not be fully passable from March 4<sup>th</sup> to June 7<sup>th</sup>. There will be blockades set up on either side of the trail by the waterline project directing residents to go out to the field and loop back the way they came.

The new valve installations are anticipated to take place on Monday, April 1<sup>st</sup>.
