

Town Forest Signage and Trail Repair Proposal

The New England Mountain Bike Association, NEMBA, briefed the Board of Selectman at the 19 June meeting and answered several questions on their plan (see below). The group proposes adding signage to the existing unofficial trail system along Arboretum Drive and over time would work to improve the trafficability of the trails for walkers and bikers. NEMBA follows a strict code that promotes responsible use of the trails they support. The Selectmen asked the Recreation Committee to consider the request which will be discussed at the next committee meeting in July. The Police Chief, Recreation Committee and Conservation Committee representatives attended this Selectman meeting. No town funds would be expended on the project. Parking and liability issues were addressed satisfactorily. Preliminary feedback from some town residents varies. Allowing NEMBA to install signs and improve the condition of the trails would make these trails more accessible and enhance this area for outdoor enthusiasts. The trails are currently used regularly by a variety of area residents. Giving NEMBA permission to proceed with their plans for the trails may result in a significant increase in use with some negative impacts depending on your point of view. **What are your thoughts on the proposal?** To assist the Recreation Committee in the development of a recommendation send your feedback no later than 7 July via email to NewingtonRecreation@gmail.com or submit your comments in writing to the Town.



When the warmer weather hits, there's nothing better than the smell of food on the grill.

Seven out of every 10 adults in the U.S. have a grill or smoker, which translates to a lot of tasty meals. But it also means there's an increased risk of home fires.

In 2014-2018, fire departments went to an annual average of 8,900 home fires involving grills, hibachis or barbecues per year, including 3,900 structure fires and 4,900 outside or unclassified fires.

Grilling fire facts

- July is the peak month for grill fires (18%), including both structure, outdoor or unclassified fires, followed by June (15%), May (13%) and August (12%).
- In 2014-2018, an average of 19,700 patients per year went to emergency rooms because of injuries involving grills.** Nearly half (9,500 or 48%) of the injuries were thermal burns, including both burns from fire and from contact with hot objects; 5,200 thermal burns, per year, were caused by such contact or other non-fire events.
- Children under five accounted for an average of 2,000 or 39%, of the contact-type burns per year. These burns typically occurred when someone, often a child, bumped into, touched or fell on the grill, grill part or hot coals.
- Gas grills were involved in an average of 8,900 home fires per year, including 3,900 structure fires and 4,900 outdoor fires annually. Leaks or breaks were primarily a problem with gas grills. Ten percent of gas grill structure fires and 22% of outside gas grill fires were caused by leaks or breaks.
- Charcoal or other solid-fueled grills were involved in 1,300 home fires per year, including 600 structure fires and 600 outside fires annually.

On June 8th, we had our first Hazard Mitigation Plan meeting at the Newington Police Department with Theresa Walker from The Rockingham County Planning Commission, Fire Chief EJ Hoyt, Town Administrator Martha Roy, Code Enforcement Officer Jeremy Boston, and Principal Peter Latchaw. We had a great discussion in updating the plan to ensure the safety of the community during a natural or man-made catastrophic event. One of the concerns discussed was notifying the community prior to or during an event. Chief Hoyt and I do have the ability to notify residents, businesses, and visitors through CodeRED Notification App. on our phones. However, it was suggested we encourage residents to sign up with the town for emergency notifications through email. Let your family and neighbors know this is a service the town provides at no cost. Another advantage, they get to read our monthly Enewsletters!!!

Due to the weather, we have not put out the speed trailer. Here are the latest statistics and locations captured.

Little Bay Road/Gundalow Landing: From May 8th to May 15th: Total vehicles: 1,787, with an average speed of 22 mph. Maximum speed was 42 mph with a minimum of 25 mph. Posted speed limit 30 mph.

205 Nimble Hill Road: From May 16th to May 22nd. Total vehicles: 3,316, with an average speed of 27 mph. Maximum speed was 49 mph with a minimum of 25. Posted speed limit 30 mph.

Bean Lane: From May 23rd-June 4th. Total vehicles: 5,191, with an average speed of 19 mph. Maximum speed was 43 mph with a minimum of 20 mph. Posted speed limit 25 mph.

School Funding Legislation

The following is an excerpt from an email from the Chair of the Coalition Communities (CC 2.0) of which the Town of Newington is a member. It is a summary of Coalition's activities during the current legislative season.

"Coalition Communities Members,

I would like to provide you with an update on recent developments at the Legislature and in the Courts related to our Coalition.

1. To the surprise of many people, the House and Senate agreed to a state budget last week without a committee of conference and yesterday (6/20/23), the Governor signed the two budget bills into law.
 - a. The most significant aspect of the budget for our organization was the increased state aid/funding for local education (K-12) without any change to the current Statewide Education Property Tax system.
 - b. Additional changes to education funding outside of the school funding formula, include:
 - i. \$10 million added to the Public School Infrastructure Fund (security upgrades);
 - ii. Added \$4 million for computer science educator incentive program and \$1 million for civics textbooks;
 - iii. Increased funding for career and technical education programs.
2. Beyond the approved state budget, there was fortunately not much to be concerned about this legislative session. Yes, there were bills addressing school funding, but between the pending court cases and a very divided House of Representatives, there was not a lot of consensus on passing any major overhauls of school funding this year. This sentiment was born out in the budget process. There were bills held over for further study so the Joint Board and the Sheehan Phinney Capital Group (SPCG) will be watching the bills closely this fall and into 2024, which is when they have deadline to be acted on in some fashion.
3. With respect to the two pending court cases involving education funding here in NH, the 'Conval Case' and the 'Rand Case,' our Coalition is in a wait and see mode. At the present time our Counsel believes that the Conval decision will take two to three months to write. The Rand case is scheduled to take place in September. Coalition Communities 2.0 is an intervener in the Rand Case. Our position in this case is that we are only concerned with maintaining the use of SWEPT within our communities. We are being careful not to take a position for or against any other education funding source in our arguments. We will continue to monitor the cases and the Joint Board will discuss preparing responses at its July meeting.
4. The CC 2.0 Joint Board holds regular monthly meetings to stay abreast of current legislative and court happenings. All member communities are welcome and encouraged to attend those meetings. Our next scheduled meeting is on July 18th at the SPCG office in Concord.

Thank you for your continued support of our organization. While we do not face an immediate issue with the role of the Statewide Property Tax in education funding overall, we must remain aware of court cases and decisions, and we have to continue to watch legislation very closely. We want to continue to protect the interests of our residents and taxpayers if any changes are proposed in the Legislature or decided by the courts.
