Newington Fire & Rescue

Well, that was a fast August if I must say so. It's amazing that the unofficial end of summer is here with the kids going back to school. Please make sure to pay extra attention to them on the roadways as they're heading to and from school. While on the subject of the kiddos and school, I think of the various electronic devices that they have available to them for their studies, both at school and home. From the various laptops, iPads or tablets to their cell phones if they're old enough. The reason I bring this up is the steady rise in rechargeable lithium-ion battery caused fires over the past several years. Lithium-ion battery technology has come so far that it is now nearly in every type of electronic device we own. Including the items above, you can add the wireless headphones, Bluetooth speakers, e-bikes, e-scooters, e-skateboards, and don't forget hybrid and electric vehicles. The list goes on and on. The point I'm getting at is that these lithium-ion batteries are everywhere and they're in our homes, vehicles, and offices. One of the great things with the advancement with technology is that it's supposed to make our everyday lives easier, which for the most part it does. Computers are much smaller, everyone has a cell phone, anyone can ride a bicycle for miles with minimal impact with emotor assist. The problem is technology has far outpaced safety regulations and standards. One of those side affects is third-party vendors using very cheap materials to manufacture similar type products and selling them much cheaper than the name brand companies. These can include the chargers and batteries themselves while not being held to the same high quality standards name brand manufacturers are held to. So, to wrap up, just be battery aware. Try not to use off brand just because its cheaper, use what the manufacturer recommends. Use the proper size charger for the device. Pay attention to the physical battery. If it looks like its deformed or bulging, stop using it and do not attempt to charge it. If the battery or device starts to smoke or give off an odor, if possible, remove it from the home, office or vehicle and place it outside in an open area away from anything combustible and call 911. I know I touched on a lot of things in a handful of sentences, but please feel free to reach out to me if you have any questions about anything that was mentioned. Lithium Ion Battery Sales for Consumers

Lithium ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, scooters, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. Take care when using them. In rare cases, they can cause a fire or explosion.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed or on a couch.
- Keep batteries at room temperature.
- Do not place batteries in direct sunlight or keep them in hot vehicles.
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.

High-Tech Luggage

Some major airlines no longer accept 'smart' luggage with non-removable lithium ion batteries as checked or carry-on luggage. The powerful batteries can potentially overheat and pose a fire hazard during flight.

In some instances, smart bags with removable lithium ion batteries will be allowed on board if the battery can be removed on site and taken on board with the customer. Check with your airline for restrictions.

The popularity of electric bikes and electric scooters (e-bikes and e-scooters) has taken off over the past few years. Lithium-ion batteries are usually the source of power for both, and if not used correctly, or if damaged, those batteries can catch on fire or explode. Whether you use e-bikes or e-scooters as your main way of getting around, or just for fun, there are important safety tips to keep in mind when charging or storing these devices.

The Problem

- Damaged or defective batteries can overheat, catch fire, or explode.
- Lithium-ion battery fires give off toxic gases and they burn extremely hot.

Safety Tips

- Only purchase and use devices, batteries, and charging equipment that are listed by a nationally recognized testing lab and labeled accordingly.
- Always follow the instructions from the manufacturer.
- Only use the battery and the charger that were designed for, and came with, the device.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Only charge one device or device battery at a time to prevent overloading the circuit.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°<u>F</u> (40°C).
- Do not store batteries in direct sunlight or inside hot vehicles, and keep them away from children and liquids.

- Store e-bikes, e-scooters, and batteries away from exit doors and anything that can get hot or catch fire.
- Only have device repairs performed by a qualified professional.
- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. Recycling is always the best option. Take the batteries to a battery recycling location or contact your local waste department for disposal instructions.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the e-bike or e-scooter if you notice any of these problems with the battery: unusual odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, smoking, or not keeping a charge.


Historical Trolley Ride will also be coming in October 15th. We are thinking of adding an extra date for the trolley due to its high demand.



POLICE DEPARTMENT



Well, it is that time of year again. School supply shopping, the smell of new school clothes, the fastest new sneakers, brown bag lunches or money for Chef Tom's hot lunches, butterflies in your stomach, SCHOOL IS OPEN!! I may be dating myself, but to be honest with yourselves, I am bringing back old memories. Not quite walking two miles up hill in the snow both ways old, but getting there!!



Guess I am feeling a little nostalgic writing this month. School House Rock was the best!!!

A reminder to give yourself extra time in the morning and use caution as the kids will either be at the bus stop, walking, or riding their bikes to school. Parents, also give your children extra time to get to school, so they are not rushing, and forgetting the safety tips you taught them.

265:54 Overtaking and Passing School Bus. -

I. The driver of a vehicle upon a way upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus, plainly marked with school bus signs or such other distinguishing identification as the director may require, which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children shall stop his or her vehicle before reaching such school bus at least 25 feet away from such school bus. The driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion, or until flashing red lights cease to operate.

Passing a school bus is a violation with a fine no less than \$100.00 and no more than \$750.00 for the first offense. The second offense is a fine of no more than \$1,000.00.

265:60 Basic Rule and Maximum Limits. -

I. No person shall drive a vehicle on a way at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions and having regard to the actual and potential hazards then existing. In every event speed shall be so controlled as may be necessary to avoid colliding with any person, vehicle, or other conveyance on or entering the way in compliance with legal requirements and the duty of all persons to use due care.

(a) In a posted school zone, at a speed of 10 miles per hour below the usual posted limit from 45 minutes prior to each school opening until each school opening and from each school closing until 45 minutes after each school closing.

Speeding in a school zone is a violation and the fine is calculated by your captured speed (how fast you are going over the posted speed limit).



The New Hampshire Air National Guard (NHANG) will be hosting the air show September 8th, 9th, and 10th, Friday-Sunday. Friday, September 8th, the NHANG will be open for current, retired military, and their family. There may be traffic delays on Arboretum Drive.

Saturday, September 8th and Sunday, September 9th, between 8:00am and 4:00pm, McIntyre Road will be closed to motor vehicle and pedestrian traffic. McIntrye Road falls within the "air box," which the FAA requires the road to be closed during air shows, for public safety purposes. **THE CLOSURE WILL NOT AFFECT EMERGENCY SERVICE/RESPONSE.**

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation will be posting signs on Newington and McIntyre Roads as a reminder. A notice will be going out from Town Hall, and we will be posting on our Facebook page.

I understand this will be an inconvenience for some. However, those of us remember the days when there was no connection from South Newington to the village.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

Nimble Hill Road Paving:

The Portsmouth Water Department is completing a water main tap on a property on Nimble Hill Road. As soon as this is completed Bourassa Construction will be paving the road. We expect it will be by the end of next week!

Paving Projects:

Bourassa Construction has been awarded the milling and paving of the following roads this fall.

- 1. Fox Point Road (from Old Post Road to Little Bay Road)
- 2. McIntyre Road (From the State Maintenance line/Newington Road to the Airport opening)
- 3. Shattuck Way (a portion-215 feet- by River Road)

The anticipated date for milling to start is October 2, 2023. It is expected to take 2 weeks to complete.

Guardrail Projects:

An eight year project to replace the old cable guardrails on McIntyre Road is starting this year. The first phase is to replace the south-west side guardrail of the McIntyre Bridge over Arboretum Drive.

Drainage Projects:

The first culvert on Patterson Lane has required significant work this last month. We will be replacing an extension pipe from it in the fall.

Roadside Mowing:

Due to the heavy rains this year the roadside vegetation has exploded! It has been a challenge to keep up with roadside mowing and vegetation cut back. Thanks for your patience!
