Newington Fire & Rescue

As the mornings are now crisp and cool with the warm afternoons, it's official, summers over. As you may be able to tell from these monthly newsletters, I really enjoy the summers. I saw a news piece the other day that said that since June 1st, 14 of the 17 weekends had some type of precipitation. That makes for a bad summer. Hopefully, we'll have a long, pleasant fall.

Things around the fire house have been steady. You may have seen the new UTV that was obtained through grant funding over the last month or two. It's a shared resource for both Police and Fire that can be used for a myriad of issues. It was most recently utilized for training, the Pease airshow, and the Sabine Memorial road race. It is a great resource for both departments and a welcome asset to have. It's that time of the year again to start the budget process. As I've mentioned before, if anyone has questions about the FD budget, please reach out to me or feel free to stop by the station. Staffing continues to be an ongoing issue. We have been able to cover our minimum staffing, but only with the help of the full time staff. With the approval from the Board of Selectmen, we applied for a grant back in March for assistance with staffing and are still waiting to hear back. The award notification could last until the end of the year, and possibly into the beginning of 2024. Inspections and calls for service have been steady alone with outside and in-house training. We recently completed our 3rd quarter department training at Newington Energy reviewing their systems and processes. Building walk-throughs and multiple technical set-ups with Tower 1 throughout the facility were also completed.

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

be warm and safe this winter!

• Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.



- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you **smell** gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

FACT

Half of home heating fires are reported during the months of **December**, **January**, and **February**.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The police department has updated their email addresses to .gov. Our old email addresses will still work. However, if sending an email, you will get notified of the change.

For the last five years, your officers have been participating in "Beards for Bucks" support of the Child Advocacy Center (CAC). Male officers will be growing facial hair and female officers will either dye a portion of their hair blue or don blue nail polish for the month of October. The Rockingham County CAC is dedicated to "pursuing the truth in child abuse cases" by coordinating a team, focused on the wellbeing of children in child abuse, neglect or sexual assault cases and prosecution. The team is comprised of law enforcement, county attorneys, protective services, victim advocacy agencies and health professions.

One of the difficult challenges of policing in a small town is enforcing town ordinances on residents, since we know most to all. We want to be fair and impartial but would also like cooperation while enforcing the laws. This doesn't mean we won't give warnings at times, giving us an opportunity to educate the public on the ordinances.

Over the last few years, the police department has received numerous complaints of non-residents or vehicles without parking permits parking on town property, dogs not on leashes, fireworks violations, or hunting on town property without the Board of Selectman's permission, to name a few ordinance violations. Enforcement was difficult without having the proper documentation process for the town and court.

We are in the process of obtaining paper citations specifically identifying Newington Town Ordinances to address the violations. Once we receive the citations, I will post the town ordinances, with the fine schedule, so everyone is aware. I know this is going to ruffle some feathers, but we want to be consistent with enforcement. If you have any questions, please let me know.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

Nimble Hill Road Shoulder Work:

Bourassa Construction will be laying processed gravel along the newly paved shoulders of Nimble Hill Road this month. We expect it will be complete by mid- October.

Paving Projects:

Bourassa Construction will be starting the milling and paving of the following roads <u>starting</u> <u>Monday October 2nd</u>. <u>Please allow extra time to get through these areas.</u>

- 1. Fox Point Road (from Old Post Road to Little Bay Road)
- 2. McIntyre Road (from the State Maintenance line/Newington Road to the Airport opening)

The milling and paving is expected to take 2 weeks to complete.

The library welcomed former Newington resident Lottie Borkland Richard to the library for the program "The History and Legacy of Reconstruction and Jim Crow Violence" on September 28. Lottie Richard is a doctoral candidate with the Department of History at UNH and will be defending her dissertation "Ignoble and Unhappy Regimes Toppled and Destroyed: Decolonizing Jamaica and American Black Activism" this fall. She currently serves as an Affiliated Professor with the Marlborough Institute of Interdiscliplinary Studies at Emerson College in Boston, and has had original research published in "Siybonana: The Africana Studies Journal" and a forthcoming publication with Journal of Black Studies. Lottie Richard may return next year for a program and discussion about the history and significance of Juneteenth.

Banned Books Week: October 1 – 7: Demands for censorship have continued to rise in the US this year. From January to August, 1,915 individual titles were challenged or banned, a 20% increase over the same months in 2022. <u>The Langdon Library endorses the ALA's Freedom to Read statement</u>, which asserts "Now as always in our history, reading is among our greatest freedoms…We believe that free communication is essential to the preservation of a free society and a creative culture." Many of the titles under scrutiny are by or about people of color or members of the LGBTQ+ community, according to the American Library Association. During Banned Books week, elevate marginalized voices and celebrate your freedom to read by checking out a "banned book" at the library!


October Building Dept Newsletter

On September 13, 2023 the Town of Newington hosted the New Hampshire Building Officials Association (NHBOA) for an ICC (International Code Council) training day covering code updates to the IEBC (2018 International Existing Building Code) and what a great turn out it was! I was very happy to have the opportunity to host and very grateful I was able to. The auditorium got a "Spruce up" with some freshly stripped and waxed floors and some other housekeeping tasks completed to prepare. The meeting space and friendly staff here at Town Hall was well received and I was asked if we could host again!
