CANDLE SAFETY

- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.
- Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that could burn.
- Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily.
- Put candle holders on a sturdy uncluttered surface.

■ Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.

- Don't burn a candle all the way down put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.



CHRISTMAS TREE SAFETY

As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly. Follow these recommended safety tips.

Picking the Tree

- Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not
- fall off when touched.



<u>Placing the Tree</u>

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand daily.

Lighting the Tree

- Use lights that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory such as UL or ASTM. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb
 - connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.



Planning Department

Piscataqua Drive and Woodbury Avenue: Discussion on December 9, 2019 of proposed developments with three property owners on Piscataqua Drive – Tax Map 27, Lot 2 (Wilcox Industries), Tax Map 27, Lot 2 (Northeast Credit Union) and Tax Map 27, Lot 1-A1 15 (proposed office building).

141 Shattuck Way, proposed hotel: The Planning Board accepted the site plan application as complete and scheduled a continued hearing for January 13, 2020. Altus Engineering and the TRC will review the project in December.

271 Nimble Hill Road: The property owner proposes a 13 lot subdivision. The property has a significant amount of wetlands. The Planning Board continued the application to January 13, 2020.

45 Gosling Road: The Board continued the public hearing for the McGovern Auto Group to December 16, 2019. This is the site of the "Old Toys R Us" building. **Mixed Use Study:** The Selectmen recommended and the Planning Board agreed to conduct an

independent study on mixed used zoning in the mall area. The two independent consultants have been contracted and are working on the study and did meet with the Planning Board on December 9, 2019.

Master Plan Update: The Planning Board continues to work on the update of the Master Plan.

SPRAGUE ODOR-

The Board of Selectmen met with representatives from Sprague on 9/16/19 about the odors coming from their plant. They continue to receive complaints about the noxious fumes.

Deer Testing Update

Under the direction of Glenn Normandeau, Director, NH Fish & Game testing of deer shot by hunters on the Great Bay Wildlife Refuge took place last week. The goal is to determine if the deer are being impacted by the PFAS contamination in surface water and brooks within the refuge. Testing samples were taken from the liver and tissue of 15 deer. Those samples are currently being analyzed at the University of Connecticut and results are expected in a few weeks. The town officials appreciate Director Normandeau for listening and acting on the concerns the town has.

Seacoast Reliability Project

Eversource and their contractors have been working hard to complete the utility infrastructure improvements in town. The town officials understand that this is a complicated process and appreciates the efforts to complete the job quickly. The Board of Selectmen has granted permission to Eversource to work longer days and some Sunday's to assist in the completion. Weather permitting; the work at the Frink Farm to restore the site will be completed this week. The work being done by the Crossings at Fox Run is now being done at night so as to not impact the shoppers. Later in the month the structures will be set in Flynn Pit, on Little Bay Road and at the Pickering property.

The polls will be open from 8AM to 7PM for all three state elections.

For the town election in March, the polls are open from 11AM to 7PM.

March 10, 2020 - Town Election - 2 shifts available - 10:30AM to 3:30PM

Or - 3:15PM to 8:30PM (to finish)

February 11, 2020 Presidential Primary

September 8, 2020 NH State Primary

November 3, 2020 General Election (Presidential Election)

Three shifts available each day - choose just one or work any two shifts:

7:30AM to 11:45AM, or 11:30AM to 3:45PM, or 3:30PM to 7:45 (to finish)

PFAS Contamination of Private Wells Update

The town is aware that 5 residential wells have levels of some PFAS chemicals that exceed the State of New Hampshire's Drinking Water Standards that became effective on September 1, 2019. The residents have been notified by the State and the Town has requested that the Air Force take action to either install treatment systems in the residents' property or connect the property to the Portsmouth public water system. Unfortunately, the Air Force, Department of Defense follows federal laws. The official statement from the Air Force is "The Air Force will continue to address PFOS and PFOA in drinking water from Air Force activities under the federal cleanup law (CERCLA) using EPA's lifetime health advisory. When public or private drinking water wells have PFOS or PFOA levels above the EPA lifetime health advisory from Air Force activities, the Air Force provides alternate drinking water, which includes installing treatment systems to remove PFOS/POA to below the EPA advisory levels or connection to municipal water".
