Spring Outdoor Safety Tips

Spring is here and it's a good time to be outside enjoying the weather. Here are some ways to help keep you and your loved ones healthy.

Beware and aware of BUGS!

Mosquitos, ticks, and fleas transmit diseases. Use appropriate insect repellent. Avoid tick infested areas such as high grass or thick brush. Shower as soon as possible after coming indoors and check your body for ticks. Check your children.

Wash and tumble dry clothing. Check pets for ticks. Consult your health care provider if you or a family member develops fever, rash, body aches, headache, stiff neck, fatigue or disorientation after a tick bite. Typically, these symptoms occur in the first three weeks after a tick bite.

Grilling out?

Use a meat thermometer to make sure meats are cooked thoroughly. Place cooked meat on a clean platter not back on the one that held raw meats. Wash hands, kitchen utensils and any surfaces that have been in contact with raw meats as soon as possible. Good rule: Keep HOT foods HOT and COLD foods COLD.

In the SUN....

Do your part to protect yourself and your family from illnesses that are transmitted when participating in recreational water activities. Do not swim if you have diarrhea, do not swallow pool water, wash your hands frequently. Avoid being directly in the sun during the hottest time of the day. Use sunscreen at least SPF 15, cover skin with clothing and wear a wide brimmed hat. Wear sunglasses to protect your eyes (UVA and UVB rays). Always be aware of signs of heat stress.

Spending time with Nature....

Drinking stream water even though it looks clear is risky business. Clear doesn't mean safe.

Cryptosporidium and Giardia are parasites that inhabit water. They are not visible and can cause significant illness. Always filter or treat water to make it safe for drinking. Protect yourself from

mosquitos, ticks and other insects by using an appropriate repellant. Check yourself daily for ticks. Ticks should be carefully removed. Bats enjoy the night life. Bats are a common sight at dusk when camping. Remind children to never touch a bat. Bats may be infected with rabies. If bitten, wash the area well and seek immediate medical attention.

May 1st -May 31st is turkey season. If you are active outside, you may be seeing hunters.

Hunting is allowed on private and public property if it is not posted and with landowner permission.

NH RSA 207:57: Harassment.

I. No person shall purposely obstruct or impede

the participation of any individual in the lawful activity of hunting, fishing, or trapping while that individual is in a designated hunting area on public lands. No person shall enter or remain in a designated hunting area on any state lands with the intent to purposely obstruct or impede the participation of any individual in the lawful activity of hunting, fishing, or trapping.



With the warmer weather, we will be seeing a lot more cyclists, runners and walkers on the roads in Newington. Slow down and give enough space to safely move around them.

265:143-a Drivers to Exercise Due Care When Approaching Bicycle. - Every driver of a vehicle, when approaching a bicyclist, shall insure the safety and

protection of the bicyclist and shall exercise due care by leaving a reasonable and prudent distance between the vehicle and the bicycle. The distance shall be presumed to be reasonable and prudent if it is at least 3 feet when the vehicle is traveling at 30 miles per hour or less, with one additional foot of clearance required for every 10 miles per hour above 30 miles per hour.

265:144 V; XI: Riding on Bicycles. – V. Persons riding bicycles 2 or more abreast shall not impede the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and, on a laned roadway, shall ride within a single lane. XI. A person propelling a bicycle upon a way at a speed less than the normal speed of traffic moving in the same direction at that time and place shall remain on the right portion of the way as far as practicable except when it is unsafe to do so or:

All members of the department have completed their yearly Ethics, De-Escalation, and Implicit Bias training, required by the department, and now mandated by the state. We do not stop at the minimum requirements. Within the next couple of months, we will be bringing in speakers and trainers to enhance our knowledge on gender sensitivity and diversity issues with law enforcement.

For now, let's focus on doing the right thing for the town our vendors and the environment by following guidelines. Please remember if you have any questions feel free to ask the attendant on duty if you have any questions.

Our tire box has been removed. Because of an increase in fees from our previous vendor we will not be collecting and storing tires anymore as we will now collect and arrange pickup after 30 or more tires reach the facility. This also will help save a little and keep our costs down.

Our electronics waste recycling is another area we can try and save a little on as I will now be recycling our fluorescent bulbs through a different vendor at a 50% cost savings. Our most expensive commodity to recycle in electronics are the old school monitors and televisions, these contain lead in the glass and can be 25 to \$50 each to recycle.

The brush area is starting to show an increase in volume but now we have a larger area to receive brush and spread it out so it can dry effectively thereby increasing its value as a chip commodity. Remember in this area to not deposit leaves and grass, these can be deposited in the compost area.

The compost is cooking down and should be ready at the end of May for all your gardening needs. Please help yourself at that time and if you need a truckload, I can have the tractor there to load you on Wednesday evenings through my email, thedumpguy@gmail.com

Regarding our reusable items- if you have any nice furniture pieces or items that may have home value an option is to bring them to the habitat for humanity location in town, as most furniture items end up in the landfill dumpster.

Please remember to get your residency stickers at the town hall and keep them on your dash or in the window.
